About the Poll: The Asian American Decisions Election Eve Poll interviewed 1,150 Asian American and Pacific Islander voters nationwide in the days just before the November 4, 2014 election, and carries a margin of error of +/- 2.9%. The sample included a nationwide baseline sample and oversamples in California, Texas, and Virginia. Voters were contacted via landline and cell-only households, and the survey was available in any of six languages at the preference of voters: Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, Hindi, Tagalog, and English. Voters were screened based on previous vote history in the 2006 and 2010 midterm elections, as well as including a mix of first time voters. All voters confirmed they had already voted early, or were "100% certain to vote". The poll was designed by Dr. Taeku Lee, Managing Director of Asian American Decisions. Final data were weighted to match the national demographic profile of Asian American voters based on ACS Census data. The project was commissioned by the AAPI Civic Engagement Fund.

Note: Some of the cross-tab subgroups contain small sample sizes and have larger margins of error. Caution should be used in interpreting results of individual subgroups, in particular when looking at subgroups within the state oversamples where cell sizes may be particularly small.
